Dear League Members,

This newsletter summarizes our activities this month and the involvement of many members and friends of the League. You can read more details about each activity in the newsletter below.

From January 16 through February 20 our Voter Registration Team set up shop in 18 locations in Sedona, VOC, Cottonwood and Clarkdale, and registered approximately 150 new voters and gave

forms to be filled out to approximately 100 more. Our next registration drive will be after the Presidential Preference Election on March 22 and will continue through April 15 with special emphasis on registering to be able to vote in the special May 17 election on the Education Proposition 123.

We launched the Sedona Civics Challenge on February 11 and 18 with great success and a lot of fun by everyone who participated. Our January and February Programs on "Dark Money" and "Education in Arizona" respectively were successful and informative about important issues we need to know about for the May and November elections.

The Political Book Club is up and running and it's even possible to start another group if enough people are interested. Ten is the maximum number that allows everyone a chance to participate.

And our membership is growing - a special welcome to new members...and strong encouragement to find a project and get involved. You'll meet terrific people and know you are making a difference in a very important election year. New members and prospective members are invited to a special gathering on March 7. <u>Prison Reform is the Topic of March Forum on Critical</u> <u>Arizona Election Issues... Don't Miss it</u>

The third program of our series "Critical 2016 Election Issues" will take place on Monday, March 21, and will feature Dr. David Wells of Arizona State University. His topic will be "Prison Crisis: Why is Arizona in the Top 10 States for Incarceration?" This series is open to the public and free of charge.

In 2002, Arizona spent 40% more on higher education than it did on prisons. Today we spend ALMOST 60% MORE on incarceration than on higher education! Private prison contracts lock the state into 20-year occupancy agreements. The state guarantees to nearly fill the facility or pay as if it were nearly full. Meanwhile, states like New York have half the incarceration rate of Arizona and have cut crime rates at the same time. Arizona needs to rethink its priorities to focus more on alternatives and transition services aimed to reduce recidivism, especially for nonviolent offenders and drug-induced crime.

This series is presented through a collaboration of the League of Women Voters Greater Verde Valley and the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. The March 21 presentation will take place from 9:00-10:30am at Yavapai College Sedona, Rm 34 -- and again in the afternoon from Noon-1:30pm at Yavapai College Clarkdale, Rm G106.

Future meetings will take place on April 18th, May 16th, June 20th, July 18th, August 15th, September 19th, and October 17th.

The Sedona Civics Challenge wrapped up on February 18th, when the winners were declared and we celebrated the League's 96th Anniversary. It was put together by League member Barbara Litrell, Andrea Houchard of NAU's "Philosophy in the Public Interest," and Paul Friedman, of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. They assembled a total of 75 questions involving Federal, State, and Local Government for the quiz show, which took place over two nights in Sedona. There were eight teams at the beginning of the competition; in the end, the City of Sedona team outdid the team from Sedona Red Rock High School in the final round. Special thanks to Rotary Club of Sedona, Rotary Club of Sedona Red Rocks, Great Decisions, Sedona/Verde Valley Secular Freethinkers, 2 Wild Card Teams from audience members, Sedona Red Rock High School, and the City of Sedona. Special congrats to the City of Sedona team and the students and teacher from Red Rock High School.

<u>Critical Issues: Dr. Rosemary Papa on the State of</u> Education in Arizona - "Ground Zero is NOT the Goal"

Dr. Rosemary Papa delivered a powerful presentation on the status of education in our state on February 15th, at a forum presented by the League of Women Voters Greater Verde Valley and the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute.

questions of candidates as to their stand on education and study the ballot issues with respect to education. **Be informed and then vote**."

Just a few of the issues that she addressed were the performance of Arizona students; teacher pay; the effects of school privatization on the public school system; the funding of public schools; tax credits and school vouchers – and more. She cited bills in the Arizona legislature having to do with funding, admissions policies, curriculum, standardized testing – and more. All of this has a weighty impact on the success of public school education in Arizona.

One of the key issues in the 2016 Arizona state elections will be the direction and funding of education in our state. From the special ballot measure election in May to the candidates who are elected to the Legislature in the August Primaries and the November General Election, the philosophy of public education and the resulting policies and priorities will chart the future course of education in Arizona.

Voter Services and Elections

The League of Women Voters Greater Verde Valley has put together an active program of registering voters, information forums on critical issues facing Arizona, and candidate forums. These efforts will continue until the fall elections are over. The goal is to provide opportunities for voters to learn the issues and get to know the candidates running for elected office.

This busy year begins with a <u>special recall election</u> in Camp Verde on March 8th. It is a mail-in election, so ballots have already been sent out to all registered voters in the Town of Camp Verde. The ballot states the grounds presented by the petition for the recall of Camp Verde Vice Mayor Bruce George and includes Mr. George's justification for his action in office. Then the ballot asks the voter to vote for 1 of 2 candidates – Bruce George or Leah Robbins. Write-in candidates can also be listed.

Women Voters, a nonpartisan political organization, encourages informed and active participation in government, works to increase understanding of major public policy issues, and influences public policy through education and advocacy.

The League of Women Voters Greater Verde Valley knows that the written statements distributed to the public are just the beginning of a dialogue between candidates and voters. So, in this election -- as in all elections -- we encourage voters to reach out to the candidates and find out their positions on the specific issues most important to them.

Remember, your vote is your voice.




National League News
